vigilant watch on the calendar, we would have never been able to accomplish our goals. We can count on Carol keeping us on track with proper custom and protocol.

Matt Valencic and his Education Committee have continued to polish our excellent education program. He and his team of dedicated volunteers have made our education programs sought after over a wide area. Please read the education committee report to be amazed at all the people those programs have touched. We are all give great gratitude for their highly successful efforts.

"Captain" Matt Valencic and his warriors have continued the battle against horribly invasive species known as European Buckthorn, Reed Canary Grass, Japanese Barberry and Multiflora Rose. Their passion in restoring fields and forest from being overwhelmed by invasive species is quite astounding. When you visit the sanctuaries, you will see a fantastic improvement.

Ban Twaddell continues to lead our dedicated trail crew constantly looking for ways to make the trails easily passable and safer. The Beaver Deceiver/Automatic Pond Leveler device they modified and installed have been working wonderfully providing a dry walk across the north shore of Fulton Pond at the Aurora Sanctuary and lake drainage control at the Molnar Sanctuary. Ban is always thinking and planning ahead for the next evolution of trail improvement. Our trails provide an awesome and much needed way to get back to nature.

I regularly hear comments from members about our excellent newsletter the *"House Wren"* created and edited by, Alison Debroux. She has kept us up to date with news on events, accomplishments and educational articles. Face Book provides another form of contact with our membership. Cathy Green kindly volunteers to monitor our Face Book account. Sharon Swaney, our Webmaster has kept our website easy to navigate and up to date.

The Documentum committee headed up by, Jim DeBroux, along with his small crew are making steady progress at sorting through our ancient document history with the goal of getting our history uploaded onto our computer providing access to all interested parties.

Stephanie Demyan is a treasurer to emulate! Her carefully and accurately maintained records of our finances show us to be in good condition. Stephanie's clear style of reporting makes the information easy to understand and allows us to plan for current and future activities. We thank her for accomplishing that tedious task.

John and Carol Lillich continue to lovingly watch over and maintain Hach-Otis our "crown jewel" sanctuary. Due to our State Nature Preserve Manager, Adam Wohlever's nomination, Hach-Otis was inducted into the Old Growth Forest Network. John and Carol also enjoy monitoring an extremely productive Bluebird trail at Hach-Otis. Thanks to Jonn and Carol for all their work.

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Ken Kressina always aims his efforts towards improvement for wildlife. He has made nice improvements in all of our Sanctuaries. For many years Kenny has worked behind the scenes with often heavy work to keep our sanctuaries enhanced for native flora and fauna.

Our chapter continues to financially support Cleveland City School's East Clark elementary school's bird club the "Bird Nerds". Even though the leader and birding coach, Buster Banish, has retired from teaching he continues his supervision and coaching these children piquing their interest in nature and allowing study, field trips and interaction with birds and birding. Buster provides an opportunity for these children that they would not otherwise have.

Jane Ellison's Nature in Your Backyard program has taken off. This program provides expert on-site advice on how to restore native habitat in their backyards to wildlife enriching the quality for wildlife. In consultation with Harvey Webster, Matt Valencic and the Shaker Lakes Garden Cub, she is refining and developing her plan. We thank her for taking on this interesting and needed program.

Mark Magree, our caretaker of the Novak Education Center maintains the building and grounds at the Novak Sanctuary. Mark is a jack of all trades when it comes to repair and enhancement of our equipment, building and grounds. Mary Salomon's work has provided a beautiful native wild flower garden with sequential blooming throughout the season. We thank them for their continued care.

Sarah Mabey is always available to offer wise and scientific advice and suggestions on projects and other evolutions for our chapter.

We have welcomed the input and participation of Tracy Engle as a new board member. Even though he is still working full time he has jumped in with both feet making his valuable time and expertise available to us.

For the 2nd year, *The House Wren* was published 8 times per year instead of the traditional 9, combining the December and January issues into a single issue. This has been a successful change, as it reduces printing costs and simplifies production during the busy holiday season.

We averaged 1193 mailings during 2023-2024, and the monthly printing and mailing costs averaged \$801 per month. The average cost per recipient was \$.67, a \$.04 increase over last year.

The Education Committee is committed to the mission of promoting the conservation and appreciation of plants, birds and other wildlife through a variety of educational activities for adults and children in the Greater Cleveland community. The backgrounds of our members in science and education are varied and impressive, which contributes to the success of the programs and events offered. It is a privilege to work with such a talented and generous group of people.





During calendar 2023 the Education Committee presented 52 programs and events that reached 1,727 adults and children.

Our **Backyard Naturalist Speaker's Bureau** presented 38 talks in-person or via Zoom that reached 943 people. Programs were created and presented by John Lillich, Dr. Sarah Mabey, Dr. Jim Tomko, Barb Philbrick and Matt Valencic covering topics such as bird migration, bird study, the migratory bird act, bird identification, feeding birds in your yard, and programs about specific groups of birds. We also presented a program about the role of native plants for birds and insects (see the ASGC website for a complete list of Speaker's Bureau talks). Talks were presented to a variety of groups such as other Audubon Chapters, libraries, Nature/Conservation Organizations, garden clubs, Scouts and retirement communities.

<u>'Third Thursdays'</u> are talks on a variety of nature/conservation topics for general audiences and presented via Zoom[©]. Four talks were presented in 2023 that reached at least 165 people (often more than one person viewing the program in their homes). The presenters were Dr. Christine Pappas, Dr. Jim Tomko, Matt Valencic and Kelly Stanek.

On February 2^{nd} ASGC members and volunteers presented ornithology displays at the <u>Kenston High School STEAM</u> <u>night</u> for K – 5th graders (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Math). The students and their parents learned about feathers and flight, beaks and their adaptation for foods, and nests and eggs. We also had tables about bird art (photography, paintings, pictures and books), and about bird watching. It was a huge success with over 100 parents and students visiting our room during the evening.

Our first <u>Winter Book Discussion Group</u> was held in February with 9 people attending to discuss the book *What a Plant Knows*. It was a small group, but the discussions were very interesting and often took us on unexpected tangents. All agreed we should do it again next year.

Training for the 6 members of the Novak Sanctuary <u>Bluebird Box Monitoring Team</u> took place in late February and included an hour of classroom work followed by a walk through the sanctuary to visit all 23 bluebird nest boxes. This was a collaboration with the Sanctuary Committee and led by John Lillich.

Three of our volunteers led bird walks for 40 <u>Aurora High School students</u> at the Hiram College Field Station as a component of their annual water quality survey of Silver Creek. Besides learning to use binoculars, students were introduced to two useful birding apps for their phones. The Merlin app helps identify birds and their songs and eBird is a citizen science project for recording your personal bird sightings anywhere in the world. Both apps are free and produced by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology. The students enjoyed the experience, and we were invited to come back again in 2024.

A new pilot program titled **Nature in My Backyard** (NMB)was launched at the ASGC Annual Meeting in June. Conceived by Jane Ellison of the Shaker Lakes Garden Club, the program aims to improve biodiversity in our backyards through education, identification and control of invasive plant species, the addition of native plants to the landscape and a reduction of turf grass (see the ASGC website for more detailed information). Homeowners are welcome to just use the resources on our website or have NMB volunteers visit their property to help them get started. The first 6 months of this pilot program included presentations to area gardening groups, garden tours, and visitation to a handful of homes. A few unsolicited and generous contributions were received for which we are very grateful. More talks and resources are planned for 2024 as well as increasing the number of volunteer team members. Jane is a member of the ASGC Board of Trustees.

<u>Chagrin River Bird Quest (CRBQ)</u> was September 8-9 with 109 people participating in the 24-hour event. A new record 140 total species of birds were identified by the 26 teams that included families, birding friends, and park naturalists from Geauga and Lake Counties. A record 72 people attended the celebration on Saturday at West Woods Nature Center where prizes and awards were presented to birders of all ability levels. This event continues to be a success because of the hard work of 20 volunteers from ASGC, Blackbrook Audubon and Geauga Park District.

2024 is off to a strong start with many Speaker's Bureau presentations and in-person events. We welcome new members to bring their knowledge, ideas, and enthusiasm to the Education Committee. Contact us at info@clevelandaudubon.org.

Financial Report Highlights - Year Ended December 31, 2023

Income Statement

Income Items

The Audubon Society of Greater Cleveland has been supported through donations in form of estate bequests, memorials, and the generous gifts received through the Annual Appeal. In 2023 the Audubon Society of Greater Cleveland received an increase in donations through several Memorials where the family of the deceased requested donations to the society in leu of flowers. We are especially grateful to those families and their generosity.

\$49,446 – Annual Appeal, Matching Funds, Memorials, Estate Bequests \$8,295 – Rental income has been steady during 2023

Expense Items

The Audubon Society of Greater Cleveland focused on improvements in the Sanctuary's during 2023 with primary focus on invasive species management, sanctuary water management, storage barn improvements and improvements to trails. In addition, the Audubon Society of Greater Cleveland teamed with the Shaker Lakes Garden Club to begin a program titled "Nature in My Backyard" (NIMB).

Sanctuary Equipment, Materials & Tools - \$18,157

Education Center Expenses - \$3,916 Education Program Expenses \$3,830 were higher than last year due to start-up of NIMB and the wonderful Annual Bird Quest which was well attended again this year. Newsletter - \$6,294 Support to Buster's Bird Nerds - \$3,000 Operations - \$13,701 includes postage, annual appeal & 100-year celebration/annual dinner. Insurance - \$8472 for all properties, buildings, and equipment

Other Income & Expense

Total Investment Income gained \$51,224. Investments in 2023 increased modestly from 2022.

Overall, for the year 2023, the overall society funds were increased by \$55,068 inclusive of investment value.

Our four wildlife sanctuaries are doing very well and are undergoing needed restoration with continued control of invasive species (European Buckthorn, Reed Canary Grass, Japanese Barberry, and Multiflora Rose). This and other activities fit nicely with our mission statement in habitat preservation.

In the **Aurora Sanctuary** Ban Twaddell and his trail crew installed a Beaver Deceiver/Automatic Pond Leveler to control the water level at Fulton Pond. The Beaver have continued to raise the water level causing the northern board walk to be regularly awash or under water. This device has worked perfectly since it was installed. Ban is planning to re-route the white blazed trail due to the extreme number of ancient trees that fell across it in a strong windstorm. Matt Valencic and his crew have cleared vast areas of Buckthorn allowing natives a chance to reclaim ground. The city of Aurora has received funding to begin its rails to trails all-purpose trail along the First Energy right of way at the northern border of our property

In the **Novak Sanctuary** Matt Valencic and his crew have cleared acres of Buckthorn from the 4 fields by mowing, lopping and daubing, and chain sawing this resistant invasives. The hours of backbreaking work are paying off. Kenny Kresina also provides mowing to keep the fields in good condition.

At the **Molnar Sanctuary**, Kenny Kresina battles invasive species, plants native species, helps keep the trail clear, and continues to keep the drain pipe free of blockage caused by Beaver. Ban Twaddell and his trail crew have installed a Beaver Deceiver/Automatic Pond Leveler to keep the water level low enough so as not to overflow the dam or release water in an unwanted direction. This Beaver Deceiver is also working very well.

Due to the dedicated care by John and Carol Lillich the **Hach-Otis Sanctuary**, is in excellent condition. The board walk underwent some deck repair. The original section of the property was nominated by State of Ohio Nature Preserve Manager, Adam Wohlever, to be included in the Old Growth Forest Network. The induction ceremony was held in late April 2024. The new section of the sanctuary is remaining a preserve for wildlife and at this time no trails have been planned. The John and Carol Lillich Meadows are periodically mowed to enhance the area's Bluebird habitat. John and Carol's Bluebird Trail fledge numerous Bluebirds each year.

Mark Magree has kept the Novak education center in fine condition. He is always ready to help with maintenance, cleaning, trimming and mowing. Mark helps greatly in trail maintenance. Mary Salomon continues to maintain the native plant wildflower gardens on the grounds around the education center and it looks fantastic.

Jane Ellison's native plant demonstration gardens were increased this year. The hope is that visitors will see the wonderful blooms that some of our natives provide sparking an interest in planting more native plants in their own backyard.

Our sanctuaries provide a protected area for our native plants and wildlife and a place for visitors to disconnect, relax, and recuperate from the stresses and intrusions of daily life. Walks in nature have undescribed healing power giving us a chance to reset our emotions and recharge our energy. We hope that many of us can benefit from these natural areas.
